A high quality sequential RE programme. Central at the RE curriculum - Study of Christianity as a living and diverse faith, focused on the teaching of Jesus and the Church. Curriculum covers a sequenced range of religions and worldviews. RE will go beyond a sociological study of religious phenomena and will introduce pupils to a range of relevant disciplines including theology, philosophy and the human and social sciences. The RE curriculum will engage and challenge them through the exploration of core concepts and questions. The RE curriculum is intrinsic to the outworking of a Church school's Christian vision in enabling all pupils to flourish. In addition, the RE curriculum will contribute to British values and spiritual moral social and cultural development It should be a coherent curriculum that enables progress through ordered and sequential learning developing both knowledge and skills. There should be a clear curriculum vision and intent, a structure for implementation and provision and a process for evaluating impact. Sufficient dedicated curriculum time, meeting explicitly RE objectives, however organised, should be committed to the delivery of RE. This should aim to be close to 10% but must be no less than 5% in key stages 1-4.	A clear expectation that as inclusive communities, church schools provide sequenced learning about a range of religions and worldviews fostering respect for others. Teaching and learning will engage with biblical texts and theological ideas. Meaningful and informed dialogue with a range of	RE will be taught in accordance with the trust deed (VA) and accordance with the locally agreed syllabus (VC) and funding agreement (Academies) Parents have the right to withdraw their child from RE. Parents can expect that in a Church school RE will have a high profile within the curriculum and will be a priority for senior leaders. Reflecting the school's trust deed or academy funding agreement parents and pupils are entitled to expect that in Church schools Christianity should be the majority religion studied in each year group and should be at least 50% of curriculum time.
